

Master of Science – Clinical Mental Health Counseling

Degree Awarded: Master of Science Requirements for the Degree: 60 credits

The Master of Science in Clinical Mental Health Counseling (CMHC) aims to develop ethically sound, research-informed, developmentally competent, and culturally aware licensed mental health counselors (LMHC). Graduates will be prepared for lifelong learning and employment to diagnose and treat mental health disorders in a variety of public and private practice settings. The primary objective of the CMHC program is to prepare students for direct entry into the practice of counseling and counseling-related fields. This program provides students with academic clinical education while simultaneously providing high impact, rigorous clinical work, application and experiences. The Standard Curriculum is a two-year intensive program for students entering the counseling field with academic and experiential background in psychology or human services and prior experiences in a related field. All students are required to complete a Practicum and two internships to develop entry-level practitioners in mental health counseling. If approved by the program director, students are eligible to take the National Counselor Examination for Licensure and Certification (NCE) during their last semester of course work.

Students must maintain insurance for the duration of the program (details may be found in the program handbook). Students must complete one residency experience. Courses may be repeated once. Failure to meet progression and minimum course grade standards will result in removal from the CMHC program.
